

## Guide to Writing Behavioral Objectives

Learning objectives are a major component in educational design. Learning objectives describe what the learner will be able to do as a result of participation in the educational event. Therefore, learning objectives should be written using *action* verbs. Learning objectives should be written in measurable, behavioral terms.

Measurable, behavioral objectives state a learner will perform a defined task or action. Examples of readily measurable, behavioral learning objectives are: (*∅The learner will*) “Discuss two contemporary approaches to acute pain management.” or “Explain the etiology of latex allergy.”

The first step to writing an acceptable behavioral learning objective is to identify action verbs that will describe the desired behavioral outcomes. Verbs like understand and learn are not acceptable action verbs because they do not describe overt behavior that can be observed by others. Some examples of action verbs are noted below under *∅The learner will*:
